"Lost" Our Gang Film Found!



1928

Available for the first time in 16mm, this was regarded as a lost film until 1991 when the nitrate print from which our negative is taken was rediscovered in France. We have been unable to locate H. H. Walker's original title texts and find his inimitable style to be exactly that, so our prints are supplied with the French intertitles and a written sheet of English translations.

The story is of unusual interest, for it centers around Farina, who lives with his mom and sister in a shack among L.A.'s oil fields. The family holds together because mom takes in laundry, but she is now sick, weak, and unable to provide even food or medicine. The Gang (Joe Cobb, Jean Darling, Harry Spear, Wheezer and others) find out the true conditions, save the day, and even wreak revenge on a grasping landlord. "A film of heart and warmth, *The Smile Wins* weaves comedy and pathos with a positive but subliminal message about race relations...This touching film...[is] funny, technically inventive, and altogether remarkable." (Leonard Maltin and Richard W. Bann, *The Little Rascals: The Life and Times of Our Gang*, 1992) 19 minutes, silent

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A TOUGH WINTER*

1930 \$160

The centerpiece of this comedy is "Stepin' Fetchit" (Lincoln Perry) presenting his unique, lethargic, shuffling, lazy black man who is always thinking hard about new ways to avoid any sort of work. Stepin' Fetchit was the "best known and most successful black actor working in Hollywood" in the 1930s (Donald Bogle), and this film was intended as a pilot for an entire series which somehow remained unproduced. He's supported by the Gang, of course, here including Farina, Mary Ann Jackson, Wheezer, Jackie Cooper and "Chubby" Chaney, although the film (being politically incorrect in the extreme) is less valuable as chibe general audience fare than as a record of the negro comic who absolutely made the mold. 21 minutes

An early talkie with Farina again the comic centerpiece among the Our Gang kids, but like A TOUGH WINTER it's more a vehicle for fine grown-up comics; Officer Edgar "slow burn" Kennedy in his patented cop role, and the wonderful if now-nearly-forgotten ethnic, Max Davidson, stepping away from his typical Jewish stereotype to play a genial maniac living in a spooky "haunted" house.

Starring Charley Chase **NATURE IN THE WRONG***

1933

Just as the Tarzan craze was sweeping the country in 1933, Charley falls in love with Muriel Evans and wants to marry her. Ronnie is also a real contender and has the inside track with Muriel's mother because of his "blue blood". Charley thus sets out to reconstruct his family tree - but Ronnie gets in the act and causes a document to reach Charley stating that he is a direct descendant of Tarzan, the Ape Man. Muriel thinks this is great - and Charley sets out to practice up on his inherited powers, dressed in a leopard skin. 19 minutes, with Film Classics main titles.

Fans and critics agree: Charley Chase's silent two-reelers made in collaboration with director Leo McCarey represents his finest work. Not all of them exist, but we are happy to announce that DOG SHY does. What's more, we have beautiful prints of this delightful and even sophisticated comedy, which has never been previously available from Blackhawk Films.

DOG SHY offers a favored Charley Chase theme: the pretty girl is trapped in an engagement to a rich pinhead, and Charley battles the odds to rescue her. By whimsy and coincidence, Charley is employed as butler in the girl's household. His mission is clear: save the lovely heroine from her betrothed. Charley's task is complicated by his lifelong fear of dogs, however, and the family has one (played by Buddy, mid-1920's also-ran to Rin-Tin-Tin, whose yelping can be seen and heard in Laurel & Hardy's later PERFECT DAY). Three parallel plots require a rendezvous at midnight, all using the same signal for action: everyone is supposed to howl like a dog, confusing real dogs, cats, and all the conspirators throughout the ingenious conclusion. We had the great good fortune to locate a 35mm fine grain master print of this magnificent comedy, and have been able to enormously improve the picture quality (and add the original main title), while retaining Gaylord Carter's precise and witty Wurlitzer score. "On Monday, Buster is married, on Tuesday he begins to assemble the mismarked house that he has inherited, on Wednesday he studies the structure that now looks like a dragon's mouth filled with wayward teeth, on Thursday he tries to provide it on the outside with a chimney and on the inside with a piano, on Friday there is a disastrous housewarming in a windstorm, on Saturday he discovers that the house has been built on the wrong side of the railroad tracks, on Sunday he manages to move it as far as the railroad tracks. The days of the week close to make a noose." (Walter Kerr, The Silent Clowns). It was wonderful before; it's amazing how much better it is, looking really good. An Educational Comedy starring Lupino Lane. Somewhere, the producers found impressive North African sets left over from some harem picture, a paragraph of a plot, and director Charles Lamont. Then they turned loose the unbelievably limber Lupino Lane for two reels of non-stop acrobatic stunts. "The body was extraordinary, as flexible as a paper doll whose joints are eyelets that permit legs to jackknife any old way. Seated on the floor, he could grab one ankle and hoist it over him in a spin that would bring him into instant standing position, confounding an unready opponent...To somersault from table to floor, or from floor to table, was nothing." ROWDY ANN

1919 \$160

In this Christie Comedy, Ann (Fay Tincher) helps father raise cattle, but her sideline is raising — cain! Father decides daughter must head for college to become a lady after he finds her with gloves on tackling a bully at the local saloon. So Ann makes her pistol-packin' way to the city by train — where she spots a card sharp and forces him out of the game. Ann causes as much action on campus as she did in Cactus Valley. A good comedy, and an interesting document of the time women were first moving out of the domestic sphere. (24 minutes at 18 fps, silent)

TEDDY AT THE THROTTLE

1916

This Mack Sennett-Keystone comedy is a stellar offering, not only because Gloria Swanson, Bobby Vernon and Wallace Beery appear in it, nor because it's a fine print with a good music score, but also because in so many ways it is typical of Mack Sennett at his best with lots of action, hilarious gags, and outrageous characterizations. Gloria is the heiress, Wally is her guardian, Bobby sometimes is her boyfriend — sometimes isn't. There's "society" comedy and low-brow stuff like chaining Gloria to the railroad track so that Wally can have revenge. But no one counted on the wit and wisdom of Teddy, the Keystone dog! 27 minutes at 18 fps, sound

Made by Ladislas Starewicz for Gelma-Film, Paris, Starewicz, a Pole, animated his first film in 1910 for the Czar of Russia's offspring. Using fantastic puppets photographed painstakingly frame by frame, Starewicz's films are the most amazingly intricate of all movie animation, a series of small masterpieces. In this film, one of his greatest, a young girl's toy dog comes to life. Pursuing its poor owner's dream of a nice fresh orange, the puppy stumbles into a nether world bacchanal hosted by the Devil himself, with a menagerie of guests worthy of Heironymus Bosch. Had Starewicz made nothing except this film, he would still rank as one of the most original and ingenious artists in film history. A shorter version has been distributed as PUPPET LOVE but this is complete in 26

Three "Allce Comedies" by Walt Disney One from each series, one with each "Allce"

"The Alice Comedies [were] Disney's first full-fledged series of films. This series ran for three and a half years, and marked a major turning point in Disney's career. In that time he graduated from ambitious beginner to experienced producer, with a studio and staff capable of producing animated films that rivaled the best in the business. Speaking of his studio in later years, Disney was fond of saying that 'it all started with a mouse' - but in fact, the foundation was laid in 1924 by a little girl." (Russell Merritt and J. B. Kaufman, Walt in Wonderland, 1992)

The animators in this series included Disney himself, Ub Iwerks, Friz Freleng, Hugh Harman, and Rudy Ising.

ALICE THE PEACEMAKER

August, 1924

With Virginia Davis as Alice, Leon Holmes and Spec O'Donnell as two rival newsboys, "Ike the Mouse and Mike the Cat are feuding thieves... A police dog chases them; Alice, with the help of a mule and an ingenious plan outwits the cop." (Merritt and Kaufman) Silent, 11 minutes at 18 fps

ALICE RATTLED BY RATS

October, 1925

With Margie Day as Alice, "The rats, free to play, entertain themselves by dancing, playing phonograph records, cavorting with the player piano, and using the bathtub for a swimming pool." (Merritt and Kaufman) This print has a music track added for a late 1920s re-issue. 8 minutes

LICE THE WHALER

July, 1927

\$75

With Lois Hardwick as Alice. "Alice and her crew dance and play on the deck of a whaling ship..." (Merritt and Kaufman). This has been newly restored from an original silent print with full aperture picture and all original ("Joseph P. Kennedy presents...") titles. 9 minutes at 18 fps.

"Of all the trick films, the best I ever saw as IF MATCHES STRUCK, a camera gem in which the library matches went on strike because the Master of the House was using a patent lighter. The rebels marched out, match by match, and enlisted the aid of the kitchen matches, which steamed out of their packets on the shelf and began rampaging around in battalions all over the house, stumbling over the enormous pile of carpets, pushing themselves under doors. The happily grouped natural objects, many times larger than life - the china in the kitchen, the jugs and decanters and table legs in the library - became important and dramatic, and the antics of the matches had a psychological as well as a humorous quality which was enchanting." THE MILKMAN

1932

A Flip the Frog cartoon by Ub Iwerks executed with great wit, working-class frankness, and pre-Code daring. "Aside from the Flip films' socio-historical significance, they are also remarkable for their inventive brand of comedy, drawing from the greatest of the silent movie clowns and combining it with the creative freedom of animation. The action in these free-wheeling exercises is just as likely to be prompted by kitchen utensils, telephones, furniture, automobiles, and the sun or moon as by the characters in the story, an infectious combination of music, slapstick, and free association without precedent or successor in the history of screen animation." (Greg Ford) 7 minutes

HELL BENT FOR ELECTION

1944, color

Academy Award-winning; animator Chuck Jones, whose work includes the everpopular Road Runner, Daffy Duck, Bugs Bunny and Porky Pig, made this cartoon through the United Film and Poster Company (later UPA) as one of Franklin D. Roosevelt's campaign tools. An antiquated, rickety steam train, "The Defeatist," competes with a sleek smooth streamliner, "Win the War Special." Only one can take track No. 44 to Washington. Complete with catchy jingles and slogans, the film cloaks a political message in entertaining animation. Blackhawk's negative was made in 1975 from a nitrate print, since destroyed, in the F.D.R. Presidential Library. 13 minutes, color.

CALIFORNIA ELECTION NEWS #1 AND #2

In 1934, well-known Socialist and author Upton Sinclair suddenly switched affiliations to the Democratic party, won the State primaries, and ran for Governor of California on an EPIC (End Poverty in California) platform. Part of Sinclair's plan was to break up large corporations, and since his opponent, Frank Merriam, was a political hack who suddenly rose to office upon the death of the previous Governor, there seemed a real chance that Sinclair might win. Thus, movie industry leaders organized the first "dirty tricks" media campaign to defeat this candidate. MGM's (anonymous) contribution included these two fake newsreels in which an "inquiring reporter" asks "people on the street" (all actors, and very convincingly cast) for whom they intend to vote and why. Of course the wild-eyed anarchists, welfare recipients and patently feeble-minded are part of Sinclair's constituency. Brilliantly executed by Carey Wilson (uncredited), the films were shown in every California theater affiliated with a major studio releasing program. Sinclair lost (6 minutes each)

NEW! HOW NICE IT WAS IN TERÉZIN*

1944/1964 \$300

Terézin, a garrison town in northern Czechoslovakia, was transformed by the Nazis into Terezinstadt, a "show" internment camp where, as long as it was thought advantageous to be able to produce them alive, some of Germany's most prominent Jewish writers, artists, musicians, and intellectuals were allowed to carry on their work. In 1944, the Nazis even made a propaganda film about the place - HITLER GIVES A CITY TO THE JEWS. It was directed by Kurt Gerron (familiar as Kiepert, the magician, in THE BLUE ANGEL) who thereafter was sent to Auschwicz with many of the "cast." Michael Bornkamp, a survivor of Terezinstadt who appears in the 1944 films, went back twenty years later with Ivan Fric, one of the original cameramen, and took new footage (including an interview with Karel Ancerl, conductor of the camp orchestra in 1944 and of the Czech Philharmonic in 1964). Bornkamp knitted 1944 and 1964 footage together in one of the most powerful film documents of the Holocaust and a work of art in its own right. Narrated in English. (Although our negative was supplied by the German producer and is therefore presumably the best obtainable, photographic quality varies considerably from sequence to sequence. The content, however, overwhelms the technical deficiencies). (39 minutes)

NEW! FIRES WERE STARTED*

1943 \$500

(Available in the U.S. only until January 1, 1994)

Humphery Jennings's Fires Were Started (here under the title I Was A Fireman in its rarely-seen longer version) is an "unpretentious memorial" to the firemen of London during the Blitz and dramatizes a day and night in the life of one unit of the Auxiliary Fire Service. It is an unforgettable human document. Events reconstructed with the use of real firemen and firewomen capture with utmost realism and great emotional impact the tragedy and the heroism of civilians at war. "...the film avoids the utilitarian ordinariness of other war documentaries and remains a masterpiece today...although particularized in time and place, the film's formal and symbolic qualities, together with its humanity, give it a universal significance outside of time. It is the masterpiece not only of Jennings but also of the British documentary school and the whole British cinema." (Jim Hillier, Studies in Documentary, 1972) (72 minutes)

1942 \$600

One of the most important early films of the radical left, NATIVE LAND combines newsreel scenes with re-enactment to depict the union busting and corporate spying that comprised the anti-labor movement of the 1930s. The film explores several case studies — a storekeeper who donated funds to the Union in Tennessee, the murder of a farmer who spoke up at a farmer's meeting in Michigan, the killing of sharecroppers in Arkansas who wanted more money for their cotton, and others. Made by the collective known as Frontier Films, the photography is by Paul Strand, direction and editing by Leo Hurwitz, and narration by Paul Robeson. Unfortunately, the production process took so long that the film was not released until after the U.S. had entered World War II, when the labor struggle had taken back seat to national unit; it's nonetheless an extraordinary social document. Prints are excellent. (88 minutes)

THE COMING OF SOUND

GEORGE BERNARD SHAW TALKS FOR MOVIETONE NEWS

1928 \$75

The great success of Fox Movietone News, made practical by the Fox-Case system of simultaneous recording of sound and picture on the same film strip, caused the dispatch of producer Ben Miggins and a sound truck (the latter now on exhibit at London's Museum of the Moving Image) to record interviews with various notables and crowned heads of Europe. Nobel laureate G.B. Shaw agreed to appear, provided he could supervise the filming himself. The playwright comes crunching down his garden path, all genial good humor, and offers an amusing six-minute monologue which includes an imitation of Mussolini (photographed earlier for the same series, and probably shown to Shaw as part of the persuasion process). The sound is clear and the total effect remains fresh and immediate. Quality is excellent. (From the same series, we also release SIR ARTHUR CONAN DOYLE) (6 minutes)

ST. LOUIS BLUES

1928 \$160

This is the only film record of Bessie Smith, photographed for a theatrical short intended to prove the viability of the RCA Photophone sound system. (The system was excellent but no one would buy it, whereupon RCA established its own film production company, RKO Radio Pictures). A pretext of plot establishes Bessie's song, which begins in her apartment, moves to a nightclub, metamorphoses into a well-executed production number, and retires into a reprise. The film is surprisingly fluid and accomplished considering the primitive technology and the temptation that would have existed just to make a filmed record of Miss Smith. It was directed by Dudley Murphy, who made the companion film BLACK AND TAN with Duke Ellington (also available from us). (15 minutes)

PUDDLE PRANKS

1930 \$75

Animated cartoons contributed enormously to the acceptance of talking pictures. This film was animated by Ub Iwerks, who had previously animated STEAMBOAT WILLIE (1928) and THE SKELETON DANCE (1929) for Walt Disney and here began his own studio with a new character, Flip the Frog (quite frog-like indeed in this early endeavor). As with the Disney efforts, the sound was recorded in P.A. Powers's independent "Cinephone" system (although sound-on-disc prints were also prepared, as our 35mm fine grain is set up for a full aperture picture/disc version). This film is more sophisticated than the earlier Disney efforts. Highlights include Flip's duel with his girlfriend, some nice bits with a chauffeur grasshopper (who is then unceremoniously eaten), and if one looks closely, a subtle wave effect in an underwater scene that anticipates Iwerks's later special effects work in Disney features. (7 minutes)

SMALL TALK

1929 \$175

The first "Our Gang" talkie and the only three-reel comedy in the series. As orphans, the Gang hopes to be placed in happy homes — where spinach isn't on the menu. Wheezer gets adopted by a rich socialite but isn't too happy about being separated from his sister, Mary Ann Jackson. When the Gang crashes a lawn party in Wheezer's new home, it causes plenty of mischief by setting off the police and fire alarms! "By contemporary standards, one is forced to admit that Small Talk and other early sound shorts are not very funny; yet in an academic sense, placed in their proper historical context, they are fascinating to watch. One must try to identify with an audience that had never experienced talking pictures. For them, the miracle wasn't how movies talked, but that they talked at all. It was literally breathtaking to hear an actor say anything." (Bann and Maltin, The Little Rascals, 1992). (25 minutes)

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EARLY CINEMA CLASSICS THE IMPOSSIBLE VOYAGE (hand colored)

1904 \$160

One of Georges Méliès's spectacular journey films, and an entirely worthy successor to A TRIP TO THE MOON which it in many ways resembles, we offer THE IMPOSSIBLE VOYAGE for the first time in a beautiful hand-colored edition complete with Méliès's original narration in script form, to be read "live" when the film is shown. In 1939, Lewis Jacobs wrote that "this film expressed all of Méliès's talents. In it his feeling for caricature, painting, theatrical invention, and camera science became triumphant. The complexity of his tricks, his resourcefulness with mechanical contrivances, the imaginativeness of the settings, and the sumptuous tableaux made the film a masterpiece for its day." (Approximately one-third of this film is also included in our film THE CINEMA MAGIC OF GEORGES MÉLIÈS, released in 1977 and still available at \$325) 20 minutes at 16 fps, color, silent



1915 \$350

This vigorous gangster melodrama, largely photographed on location in New York's slums and waterfront, was the first film directed by Raoul Walsh. Walsh trained under D.W. Griffith and here achieves performances which are intimate, confrontational, and astonishingly free of theatrical mannerism. He also seasons his film with colorful "types" from the alleys and docks, builds his scenes from short, precisely-edited shots which would do credit to his mentor, and generally achieves a smashing debut. The photography by Georges Benoit uses moving camera and is outstanding; despite some nitrate decomposition, it is seen to advantage in this excellent print. In recent years REGENERATION has been shown at the New York Film Festival and in other special situations; modern audiences find it stunningly impressive. (70 minutes at 18 fps, silent)

WAY DOWN EAST (tinted version)

1920 \$950

This is a virtually complete roadshow version copied in color from 35mm tinted material of D.W. Griffith's wonderful melodrama, fitted with an orchestral score recorded in 1928 for the previously-available reissue version but here expanded and adjusted to fit the much longer and differently-edited original edition. Except for THE BIG PARADE, WAY DOWN EAST was the most successful film of the 1920s. Sophisticates laughed when Griffith paid \$175,000 for the rights to Lottie Blair Parker's 1898 stage play, but the filmmaker observed that a show which had run for twenty years had to have some extraordinary qualities. To them Griffith added location shooting over all four seasons, his own deep feeling for rural America in horse-and-carriage days, luminous performances, and the sensation scenes from Tess of the d'Urbervilles and Uncle Tom's Cabin. The result is a film which even today sets audiences whistling, stomping and cheering, (125) minutes at 24 fps with sound) (We can also provide the b&w reissue version, 104 minutes, at \$575)

TOL'ABLE DAVID

1921 \$500

"...a very powerful film in which [the director, Henry] King, the student of Griffith and the employee of Ince, combines the best of both masters. King's world in TOL'ABLE DAVID is similar to Griffith's Kentucky: rural, homey, gently comic, touching, pastoral. Into the peaceful world come the violent figures from outside, three fugitives from justice, who are as vicious, as nasty, as psychotically mean as...the degenerate families in Sam Peckinpah's STRAW DOGS (1971)...King knows how to bring a story alive by manipulating the visual, "plastic material." Richard Barthelmess, Griffith's own figure of gentleness and sincerity, plays

THE GIRL WITH THE HATBOX

A completely hilarious and charming romantic comedy featuring the extraordinary talents of director Boris Barnet and actress Anna Sten - later a star for Goldwyn in the thirties. Anna works in a hat shop - sharing her small apartment with a penniless student. She is given a supposedly worthless lottery ticket instead of her wages by her unscrupulous employer. The ticket wins her a fortune and a madcap chase ensues to possess the ticket - and Anna's love. THE GIRL WITH THE HATBOX moves with the speed and grace of the best of the American silent comedies. Boris Barnet, a Russian director of English ancestry, was the great comedic genius of Soviet cinema with such films as THE HOUSE ON TRUBNAYA SQUARE, OUTSKIRTS and THE GIRL WITH THE HAT BOX. With an added orchestral score and Russian intertitles with English subtitles. 67

REBECCA OF SUNNYBROOK FARM

1917 \$395

Jesse Lasky wanted Cecil B. De Mille to direct this picture to revive Mary Pickford's career. "She has insisted on doing typical Pickford stuff until the public has become tired of it," wrote Lasky. De Mille agreed instead to do two Pickford pictures to try and break the stereotype; ultimately, they were A ROMANCE OF THE REDWOODS and THE LITTLE AMERICAN. On May 26, 1917, Al Lichtman, Lasky's general sales manager, wrote to him that "Judging from the letters that we have received from various exhibitors it would be well to bear in mind the fact that Miss Pickford should have charming girlish roles giving full play to her smile and curls, and comedy should dominate her stories." Lasky then wrote to Cecil: "We learn something new every day in the picture business...Lesson 999 would seem to be: ;They don't; want little Mary in anything but little pictures with curls featured." Thus, Marshall Neilan made this smash hit which, as one commentator has written, "approximates the basic character of Mary Pickford and is probably her definitive interpretation of it on the screen." The 35mm source material was not of the highest quality so the 16mm prints display more than ideal contrast. 80 minutes at 18 fps, silent

Bright Stars of the Early Western Sky

THE MASSACRE

1912 \$160

A visually striking western directed by D.W. Griffith for the Biograph Company. A Southern girl (Blanche Sweet) rejects Wilfred Lucas for Edward Dillon, Years later, both the couple die and Lucas is left the guardian of their daughter (also Blanche Sweet). When she grows up he asks her to marry him, but she chooses Charles West instead. Two years later the "little family" joins a wagon train to the west. The indians are on the warpath because of an attack which has recently been made upon them by the whites, and they attack the wagon train. The last half of the film is given to an impressive staging of the attack, the behavior of the besieged, and the rescue, in one of the largest of Griffith's pre-feature endeavors. (34 minutes at 18 fps, silent)



A KNIGHT OF THE TRAILS

1915

Directed by William S. Hart and Produced by Thomas H. Ince. In this well-structured and action-packed two-reeler, Hart is cast as Jim Treen, who appears to be the most eligible bachelor in Canyon City but who, in reality, is the bandit that has made a long series of successful stage hold-ups in the area. Treen is in Love with Molly Stewart (Leona Hutton) who, finding out his true profession, rejects him for the real villain of the piece, W. Sloane Carey (Frank Borzage, at the beginning of his distinguished career). Carey beats it out of town with Molly's nest egg, but the good/bad man catches up with him, recovers the money, restores Molly's savings to her and becomes her husband. Blackhawk's negative was copied from a nitrate reissue print of 1923, and print quality is excellent. (27 minutes at 18 fps, silent)

THE INVADERS

1912 \$230

Francis Ford directed this early short feature made by Kessell & Bauman for their Bison Brand films for distribution through Mutual. It became the subject of a lawsuit from Carl Laemmle, who claimed the trade mark, so the film was retitled with the quickly-devised "Kay-Bee" designation which was used for Inceproduced westerns thereafter. The story deals with indians and the frontier. Francis Ford also plays the cavalry Colonel in which The Moving Picture World said was "a magnificent characterization not unlike that of General Custer." The Colonel's daughter is Ethel Grandin, and the telegraph operator who appears briefly is Art Acord, a real cowboy who wandered into the movies and became a popular western and serial star in the early 1920s. The film is full of action and pictorially excellent; Blackhawk's negative was taken from an original nitrate release print and the quality is very good. (46 minutes at 18 fps, silent)

BEFORE HOLLYWOOD, THERE WAS...

... Fort Lee, New Jersey

A MOVIE ROMANCE

1917 \$175

When this film was made, a dozen major studios were operating in the Palisades village of Fort Lee across the Hudson River from Manhattan's Washington Heights. This is perhaps the most detailed look we shall ever have at production in this period. The studio illustrated is the Paragon, established in 1914 by the Eclair Company. Their star director was Maurice Tourneur, who made the feature A GIRL'S FOLLY from which this release was edited. Included are views of the glass stages, rotating sets, tank for water effects, laboratory, projection room, and crews at work on various aspects of production—all tied together with an amusing little story which is hardly hurt by condensation. (31 minutes at 18fps, silent)

EVERETT TRUE BREAKS INTO THE MOVIES

For over a decade, Chicago rivaled New York and Los Angeles as a center of motion picture production. Essanay (seen in the Charlie Chaplin comedy HIS NEW JOB), Selig, Reelcraft and many others had Chicago studios. One such was the American Bioscope Company, or ABC, which released on a states rights basis. This comedy took advantage of ABC's actual studio and its wide variety of sets, not to mention its actual entrance, casting rooms, and office areas, and has become a revealing document of Chicago filmmaking more than 75 years ago. (15 minutes at 18 fps, silent)

Gladys Hulette came to the screen from Broadway, where she had supported such stars as DeWolfe Hopper and Nazimova. The high point of her film career was when she played opposite Richard Barthelmess in ToL'ABLE DAVID (described elsewhere in this Bulletin). But beyond affording a peek at this (now forgotten) star, its story leads us into the new Edison studio in the Bronx, giving a behind-the-scenes look at moviemaking at the end of 1914. The Civil War, and a Confederate spy is about to be hanged by Union soldiers. The final seconds of his life are the heart of this half-hour film, which is a brilliant illustration of the power of cinema to reveal emotions through camera, editing and sound effects; to objectify psychological time and liberate it from clock time; and to replace words with images yet preserve the complexity of thoughts expressed. Robert Enrico's French film adaptation is probably more famous by now than the Ambrose Bierce story upon which it is based. Our prints are from the authentic U.S. negative, although it has been overused with the result that some negative wear is visible on screen in the first few minutes. 29 minutes

This is a film about the vastness of space and about the ability of man to comprehend it. It is about the quest for transfiguration through science, and its artistic and spiritual importance is no more limited by the astronomical knowledge and earthly clothing of thirty-some years ago than would be true of a work by Rembrandt or DaVinci. The trip from Toronto's David Dunlap Observatory to galaxies so distant that they are known only by rays of light which left them before the dawn of life on earth is accomplished through animation effects which inspired the ones for 2001: A SPACE ODYSSEY (Kubrick hired Wally Gentleman, who did them). Directed by Roman Kroiter and Colin Low, Produced by Tom Daly for the National Film Board of Canada. Prints are from an authentic negative and are excellent. Restricted to U.S. destinations only. ARNE SUCKSDORFF

Arne Sucksdorff of Sweden won international recognition as a poet of non-fiction film with this series of award-winning shorts. "In a genre where words have become an obsession, he has shown how a film can dispense altogether with them and still make its meaning clear and compelling. He handles the camera as freely and fluently as if it were a brush in his hand, so that his pictures seem to reach the screen with a freshness and immediacy which deny the intervening mechanical process. In terms of virtuosity of technique, it is probably the most impressive of Arne Sucksdorff's short nature films. Original title: TRUT! (Sea Hawk). "This wartime film, though produced in neutral Sweden and seemingly detached from the war, was widely interpreted as a parable about Nazism." (The Museum of Modern Art) (10 minutes)

Sucksdorff's camera moves as fluently through Stockholm as before it had moved through the forest. Indeed, the city never loses its ties to nature; the movement of people is compared to the searching of sea gulls; a rain shower drives young boys to cover, and sheltering in another doorway a couple meets, exchanges glances, touches hands, and joins destinies when the sky clears. Contemplative and impressionistic, this exquisite little work won an Academy Award for Best Short Subject of 1948. (12 minutes)
