To arrest Translate:	To detain someone for questioning.	The police arrested the man on suspicion of murder.
To bake Translate:	To make bread or cakes.	She baked the bread fresh every morning.
To bake up Translate:	To plan something	She's always baking up strange ideas.
To build <i>Translate:</i>	To make something by putting bricks or other materials together.	They built the new houses near the town.
To build up Translate:	To make bigger and stronger	He needs to build up if he's going to play Rugby.
To carry Translate:	To transport or take something from one place to another.	The porter carried her bags to her room.
To clean Translate:	To organise somewhere to make it clean and tidy.	The cleaner cleaned the office yesterday.
To clean out Translate:	To remove the old.	You need to clean out the Guinea Pigs on Saturday.
To clean up Translate:	To tidy and organise.	Make sure you clean up when you've finished.
To cook Translate:	To prepare food to eaten by making it in a crtain way.	The chef cooked a beautiful meal.
To cure Translate:	To make someone with an illness healthy again.	The doctor cured his headache.
To deliver Translate:	To take goods, letters, parcels etc. to people's houses or places of work.	The postman delivered my birthday cards.
To engineer Translate:	To design and build something using scientific principles.	They engineered the new building to the highest specifications.
To extract Translate:	To remove or take out something.	The dentist extracted the rotten tooth.
To fix <i>Translate:</i>	To repair something.	The carpenter fixed my broken chair.
To invent Translate:	To design and/or create something which has never been made before.	The scientist invented a new drug.
To judge Translate:	To form, give or have as an opinion, or to decide about something or someone, especially after thinking carefully.	The judge judged him guilty.

To manage Translate:	To be responsible for controlling or organising someone or something especially a business.	He managed the whole department very well.
To make Translate:	To produce something, often using a particular substance or material.	I work for a company that makes garden furniture.
To mend Translate:	To fix something.	The electrician mended my old computer.
To nurse Translate:	To care for a person or an animal while they are ill.	The nurse nursed the patient.
To opérate Translate:	To cut a body open for medical reasons in order to repair, remove or replace a diseased or damaged part.	The surgeon operated on the leg to save it from amputation.
To phone Translate:	To communicate with someone by telephone.	The representative phoned his customer.
To photograph Translate:	To take a photograph of something or someone.	He photographed the murder scene.
To repair Translate:	To mend something.	The plumber repaired my sink.
To serve Translate:	To deal with a customer by taking their order, showing or selling them goods etc.	She served the customer his beer.
To shave Translate:	To remove hair from the body, especially a man's face, by cutting it close to the skin with a razor, so that the skin feels smooth:	The barber shaved him very quickly.
To type Translate:	To write using a machine, either a computer keyboard or a typewriter.	The secretary typed the report.
To weld Translate:	To join two pieces of metal together permanently by melting the parts that touch.	The welder welded the pipes together.
To spring-clean Translate:	To clean all of a place, especially your house, very well, including parts you do not often clean.	I spring cleaned yesterday.
To work at Translate:	To try hard to achieve something.	They really worked hard at their marriage.
To work off <i>Translate:</i>	If you work off an unpleasant feeling, you get rid of it by doing something energetic.	I worked off my anger at the gym.
To work out Translate:	To calculate or try to understand something.	The policeman worked out what caused the accident.
To work over Translate:	To hit and beat someone repeatedly .	They worked him over well.
