Come across <i>Translate:</i>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> To find by chance. The candidate <i>came across</i> as a dynamic person during the interview.
Come along <i>Translate:</i>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> To accompany someone; go somewhere with someone. To tell someone to hurry. To arrive, appear. To improve, develop or make progress. 	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> Alex decided to <i>come along</i> with me to watch the parade. "<i>Come along</i> Emily. You don't want to be late for school!" "Tony needs a job. If an opportunity <i>comes along</i> he's determined to seize it." "How's your mother <i>coming along</i> since she broke her leg?"
Come apart <i>Translate:</i>	To separate into pieces.	"I need to get my glasses repaired. They <i>came apart</i> when they fell off the table."
Come around	To change one's opinion; finally accept someone's way of thinking.	I think the supplier will <i>come around</i> to our way of seeing things.
Come back <i>Translate:</i>	To return.	He hopes his son will <i>come back</i> one day.
Come before <i>Translate:</i>	To be more important than.	Carla always says that her family <i>comes before</i> her career.
Come by <i>Translate:</i>	To manage to get, especially something that is difficult to obtain or find.	"How did you <i>come by</i> such a beautiful location to build your house?"
Come down with <i>Translate:</i>	To become ill with.	The architect planned to attend the inauguration but he <i>came down with</i> the 'flu yesterday.
Come forward <i>Translate:</i>	To present oneself; volunteer.	The police have asked any witnesses to <i>come forward</i> .
Come out <i>Translate:</i>	To become known.	The truth will <i>come out</i> sooner or later. It's just a matter of time.
Come to <i>Translate:</i>	To regain consciousness.	The woman fainted when she heard the news but she <i>came to</i> quite quickly.
Come up	To appear, occur or present itself unexpectedly.	- "The subject <i>came up</i> at the meeting." - "Sorry I'm late. Something <i>came up</i> at the last minute."
Come up against <i>Translate:</i>	To be faced with or opposed by (a reaction).	The plan to demolish the old theatre <i>came up against</i> a lot of criticism.
Come up with <i>Translate:</i>	To produce a plan or idea.	Sacha <i>came up with</i> a great idea for the party.
Come upon <i>Translate:</i>	To find or discover.	The police <i>came upon</i> a stock of firearms in a disused mine.
